



This is my fourth annual report and will be my last as chair of the trust as I will stand down from the role in the coming months.



MAJOR GRANTS

MAJOR GRANTS

During 2011-12 the Community Trust of Southland (CTOS) awarded 15 major grants totalling almost \$2.2 million. The funding allowed several key regional projects to be developed and secured the operating future of other organisations – regarded as important contributors to the wellbeing of the area.

The care and support of families and youth is an important goal for CTOS. This year several agencies received major grants which enabled them to continue their services.

The **Foundation for Youth Development** received \$57,200, the third year of funding for the delivery of KiwiCan, a programme run in eight Southland primary schools and Project K, which operates at Gore High School.

Southland Youth One Stop Shop was granted \$110,000 for its operational funding and **Invercargill Secondary Schools' Network** \$180,000 to continue the delivery of its services to students at risk of suspension, exclusion and/or expulsion from school.

Jigsaw Central Lakes delivers a family violence support service in the Wakatipu area and received \$54,402 for operational costs, while Families First – Queenstown, which provides counselling and support services to children, adolescents and their families with "mild to moderate" mental health needs, was granted \$75,036.

Royal NZ Plunket received \$100,000 – the third year of funding for a lactation consultant in the region and **Southland Warm Homes Trust** was granted \$25,000 towards its work providing free energy assessments and post installation audits of Southland homes.

Facilities throughout the region received a major boost through significant funding. \$2 million went to the **Southland Indoor Leisure Centre Trust** towards the cost of rebuilding Stadium Southland which collapsed following the 2010 September snow storm. \$50,000 was allocated to **Te Anau Bowling Club** for extending its clubrooms and the **Queenstown Lakes District Council** received one of the largest CTOS grants for the 2011-12 year with the allocation of \$400,000 towards the \$2.5 million upgrade of the Queenstown Memorial Hall.

Other organisations in the region to benefit from a major CTOS grant include: **Environment Southland** \$40,000 for the Invercargill to Bluff Walk & Cycle Trail stage 2; **Rugby Southland** \$254,500 towards operating costs; **Southland Basketball** \$70,000 towards running the Sharks Basketball Team for 2012; **Sport Southland** \$180,000 for operating costs and **Venture Southland** \$394,475 for operating costs.

GRANTS

ALL OF THE COMMUNITY TRUST OF SOUTHLAND AREA

During 2011-12 CTOS granted more than \$1.3million to organisations that provide services, support and sporting opportunities throughout the entire region.

Operating Costs

For many not-for-profit agencies the high cost of the basics – such as rent, electricity, insurance and the likes – chews up valuable funds and causes uncertainty. For CTOS, funding operating costs for up to three years means those groups can focus purely on offering the community their specialised services and support.

Among those to receive funding for operating costs last year

were: Victim Support groups in Invercargill, Queenstown and Gore; the Royal New Zealand Foundation for the Blind; the Southland ACC Advocacy Trust, which offers free legal advice and representation to ACC claimants who can't afford a lawyer; Conductive Education which runs programmes for pre-school and primary school children with motor skills disorders and the Ronald

McDonald House Trust, which provides accommodation to the families of children from the CTOS area who have to travel outside the region for the health care of a child.

Community Programmes

Several agencies received funding to help them develop and deliver crucial programmes to the CTOS community:

Presbyterian Support
Southland received a major
grant of \$135,645 for social
services targeting the needs of
two groups - older people living
in the community (Supportlink),
and children/young people and
their families (Family Works).

Supportlink helps break down social isolation by linking volunteers with older people living independently. Family

Works services include: foster care; a buddy programme; grief groups for children facing the loss of someone close to them; temper tamers for 7 to 10 year olds who have difficulty expressing their feelings (particularly their anger) and counselling and social work support for both children and their families.

Part of the \$10,629 grant **The Parenting Place** received was to subsidise Toolbox classes.

These aim to equip parents with the skills and ideas to make parenting more rewarding through a range of parenting programmes tailored to specific communities and needs. They include small group parenting courses, workshops, community wide events, events for Maori and Pasifika people, a family coaching service, online advice and books and other resources.

The other part of the funding was for the Attitude programme which provides health education and life skills for high school children. Attitude messages address suicide, pregnancy, drug and alcohol abuse, depression, bullying, and sexually transmitted infections. The programme helps young people gain a fuller

understanding of the pressures facing them and teaches them how to develop coping strategies.

The Southland Piping & Drumming Development Trust was established in 2007 to address the declining number of skilled pipers and drummers in Southland. With ongoing

in Southland. With ongoing support from CTOS it has made a significant impact on piping and drumming in Southland and two full time tutors are now employed. For the 2011-12 year (across the region) there were a

total of 81 pipers, 61 drummers, 37 new recruits for piping and 35 new recruits for drumming.

Events

Hosting events in Southland not only means no travel and accommodation costs for locals, but it also means the opportunity for more people to become involved. Organisations to benefit during 2011-12 include:

During 2011-12 CTOS granted more than \$5 million in funding to organisations that offer support/services to the Southland community.

Sport & Recreation

Academy Southland (Excellence in Sport South Island) provides a range of initiatives which add value to the sport environment for

promising athletes - and their coaches - in Southland. During 2011-12 it received \$36,000, bringing the total CTOS funding, since 2002, to \$172,500.

Families

Barnardos is a charitable trust providing early childhood care, education and social support services for children and families in Southland. It

received \$57,189 for operational funding and co-organising two events - the parenting show called "Building Awesome Families/ Whanau" which featured Pio Terei, and National Children's Day celebrations.

The **Southland Council NZ Reading Association** received \$27,780 for its Book for Babies project which aims to give a hardcover book to every baby born in Southland, during 2011 and 2012.

Arts & Culture

A \$20,000 CTOS grant towards **Chamber Music New Zealand's** 2011 "Kaleidoscope" Concert Season in Southland, saw six concerts featuring world-class chamber musicians perform in Invercargill.

The **Dan Davin Literary Foundation,** which endeavours to develop and encourage participation in the Literary Arts, received \$21,234 towards operating costs.

Te Wharekura o Arowhenua

is the only wharekura (Maori Immersion School) offering Year 1 - 13 students education in Te Reo Maori in Southland.

It received \$2,960 from CTOS towards organising and running the Hautonga Kapa Haka Championships which were held in Gore (for the first time) in August 2011. The competition was open to all Southland and Otago secondary schools. Ten groups of 30 students performed to an audience of around 1,500 people.

Environment

The Southland Wetlands Working Party - a combined group of representatives of the four councils in Southland and the Department of Conservation - was set up to organise the **National Wetland Trust of New Zealand** (2012) 5th National Wetland Symposium, in Invercargill. CTOS granted \$3,000 towards the costs of running the event.

Community Support

The **Southland Community Law Centre** provides free legal services to the community of Southland. Its services include information, assistance, advice, representation, advocacy and law-related education. The CTOS gave \$15,000 towards the centre's operational costs.

Southland Community House received \$24,344 to provide information, services, support and facilities to organisations working in Southland's community and voluntary sector as well as housing 12 Southland community organisations. \$22,000 was also channelled through them towards the establishment of a Volunteer Centre and Work Skills Bank. The Volunteer Centre will support people working with volunteers and those wishing to volunteer.

Young People

CTOS granted \$2,000 to the Proactive Drive Youth Driver Education Trust towards costs associated with a three-week Proactive Drive programme. It was offered to school students in the Southland region who already held a driver's licence. Held at Teretonga Park, the programme involved small groups of 10-12 students participating in theory and

practical driving lessons. All participants had a turn behind the wheel with a driving instructor showing them practical ways to react in what could be life threatening situations. The course highlighted vehicle awareness, how the car behaves in certain conditions and why, along with providing knowledge on how a driver can change the outcome of possible collision situations.

The YMCA Charitable Trust of Invercargill received \$10,000 towards the cost of ongoing repairs at its Omaui Camp. The camp is a popular venue for primary and secondary schools from Southland and Central Otago as well as other community groups.

CENTRAL SOUTHLAND

Sport & Recreation

The Central Southland Squash Rackets Club won the Squash Southland 'Southland Club of the Year' Award in 2011 in recognition of the opportunities it created for people to play squash and for increasing the number of people participating in organised competitions. It also received \$9,400 of CTOS funding

to help with its club house upgrade. Stage one of the refurbishment had already been completed, with new heating, exterior paintwork, seating and curtains giving the 32-year-old club rooms a much needed revamp. CTOS supported that phase with a \$16,500 grant. The new grant allowed the club

Wallacetown Senior Citizens received \$800 for its operating costs. The organisation has monthly meeting get-togethers, outings to places of interest, afternoon teas and two annual bus trips.

Art & Culture

Lochiel School was granted \$750 towards the cost of running the Central Southland Music Festival which occurs every two years and is held at Central Southland College in Winton. The Festival encompasses 12 schools in the Central Southland area, Hedgehope, Heddon Bush, Isla Bank, Winton, Waianiwa, Limehills, Central Southland Rural Primary, Dipton, Hillside, Lochiel, St Thomas', and Wallacetown Schools.

The **Eastern Southland Gallery** received funding of \$48,454 towards Stage 3 of a six stage restoration plan for the East Gore

Arts Centre project. CTOS has already contributed \$51,000 to the project which when completed will feature the Muka Studio and a multifunctional Art centre. The Gallery also received support for the Seaward Bush Exhibition which featured pieces about Southland's environmental history created by 12 contemporary artists who live in, hail from or have

strong connections to the region. There were also historical maps, survey plans and photographs relating to Seward Bush. CTOS granted \$1,566 towards running the seven-week exhibition that was attended by about 1,350 people.

The **Gore Pipe Band** provides uniforms, pipes, drums, tuition and support to its playing members. The band plays at a variety of events in the community throughout the year including ANZAC

Day commemorations, Stags' games, the Edendale Crank Up Day, A&P Shows, Christmas parades and the Hokonui Moonshiners Festival. It received \$500 towards the cost of upgrading equipment.

Heritage

The Gore District Historical Society received \$1,752 towards

the purchase of two digital recorders and training workshops for volunteers who will begin collecting oral histories. Several key people in the area have been identified as having stories that need to be recorded.

The Waimea Plains Railway
Trust received a \$10,000
grant towards the cost
of transporting historic

rail fixtures to Mandeville. Rail carriages, low loaders and a locomotive – all from the 1880s – were among the items to be brought south by road from as far away as Christchurch. They will form part of the vintage rail heritage precinct at Mandeville which will re-commission part of the original Waimea Plains Railway of the 1880's. It will include the original Kingston Flyer (K92), historic track, sleepers and even a windmill.

Community Support

CTOS helped Mataura Primary School continue to employ a

Healthy Families Programme co-ordinator. The school has a decile 1 rating, with about 100 Year 1 to 6 pupils, 30% of whom are identified as Maori. A \$16,740 grant enabled the school to continue employing the co-ordinator during the 2012 academic year, for 10 hours a week.

The Eastern Southland Newcomer Network (ESNN)

received \$2,750 for the migrant

services it offers. ESNN supports the social and recreational interactions of newcomers to the Eastern Southland area, recognising the difficulties refugees and migrants may face when settling in New Zealand.

The importance of parenting to the health and wellbeing of our children and community is why CTOS granted the **Royal NZ Plunket Society - Mataura** \$1,750 towards the cost of hosting the Parents Inc Manaaki Whanau Parenting Show.

Education

St Peters College was granted \$15,168 towards the cost of installing a playground. With a 2011 roll of 408 Year 7 to 13 students, the only play equipment it had was balls and hoops. The new playground design is made for children aged 11+, has extra height and strength components and encourages active, climbing and swinging play.

Sport & Recreation

The Waikaka Combined Sports Association umbrellas all sporting codes played in the Waikaka, Otama, Maitland, Knapdale, Willowbank and Waikaka Valley areas and surrounds. It is responsible for managing the Waikaka Sports Complex, which comprises rugby grounds, squash courts, tennis/netball courts, changing rooms, showers, kitchen and lounge/bar facilities. The complex is used by up to 400 sports people each year and the venue is hired to outside organisations, group and families for meetings, dinners and various social functions. CTOS granted it \$20,000 towards re-roofing the sports complex and painting the squash courts.

FIORDLAND

Sport & Recreation

A major grant of \$50,000 was allocated to the **Te Anau Bowling Club** for its plans to extend its clubrooms to allow space for two indoor bowling rinks. The existing clubrooms barely met the current needs of all its users, with poor insulation, ventilation and

access for disabled. Te Anau has few recreational choices for the elderly during the winter months and the project, to extend the building to accommodate two full-size indoor bowling mats, will provide a new opportunity for the older folk. The upgrade will also include better wheelchair access.

The Marakura Yacht Club received \$500 towards hosting the New Zealand Trailer Yacht Championships.The club operates

on Lake Te Anau and has approximately 80 members. The regatta promoted and encouraged yachting in the south with boats and crews from Christchurch, Dunedin and Queenstown, Invercargill and Te Anau competing in the event.

Community Support

The Fiordland Community
House project received \$13,755
for operational costs and

assistance towards refurbishing the former Fiordland Medical Centre to use as a community house in Te Anau. Several visiting organisations plan to use the space to see clients, including the Southland ACC Advocacy Trust, Supporting Families and Adventure Development - youth alcohol and drug counselling. The local Search and Rescue unit will use the garage and adjoining office to store its equipment.

The **Te Anau Youth Worker Trust** was granted \$15,925 for operating costs. The fulltime youth worker has an active involvement in the local schools and organises cultural and sporting events and recreational programmes for young people in the area.

INVERCARGILL & BLUFF

Sport & Recreation

The **Oreti Surf Life Saving Club** has 33 members and patrols Oreti Beach each weekend during the summer season. In 2010-2011 lifeguards worked 1160 hours, undertook 296 preventative actions, as well as rescues and administering first aid.

CTOS granted it \$4,800 towards the purchase of an all terrain vehicle to assist with the transportation of equipment, beach patrols and rescues.

Community Support

Specially trained Hearing Dogs provide valuable services to deaf and hearing-impaired people in much the same way as guide dogs for blind people. There are more than 50 Hearing Dogs in New Zealand already matched with deaf or hearing-impaired people, including two in Invercargill. The dogs are trained to listen for and alert

their recipient (by gently pawing them) to sounds such as: smoke/ fire alarms, alarm clocks, door knock/door bell, telephone/fax ringing, portable timer or baby.

The CTOS granted \$5,000 to Hearing Dogs for Deaf People
New Zealand towards training costs. Training is done at the
National Training Centre in New Plymouth at a cost of \$13,500 per
dog. Ten Hearing Dogs are trained each year.

SeniorNet (South) received \$2,643 towards the costs of hosting a 'Celebration of the Older Person'. The event, held in October, provided a forum to showcase clubs, organisations, activities and hobbies suitable for older people. It was also an opportunity for Southland's seniors to enjoy a social and fun day out.

Environment

The **Bluff Hill/Motupohue Environment Trust (BHMET)** was granted \$10,000 towards the purchase of poison and rat traps. BHMET has been working during the past three years to preserve and restore the native flora and fauna in the Bluff Hill area by

practising pest control, reestablishing native plant species, and translocating bird species.

Bluff Primary School received the entire \$2,222 funding it needed for materials used in its project to replant Bluff Hill/Motupohue in native vegetation. The students have been learning to: source seed from the native bush; prepare,

sow and pot seeds and propagation techniques. The grant helped with the purchase of seed raising mix, potting mix, plastic planter bags, two wheelbarrows, spades, trowels, secateurs, garden fork, pick, hose and rose fittings, wood and material for cloches.

Arts & Culture

The **Invercargill Tongan Trust** received a \$3,500 grant towards the cost of running language and dance programmes for Tongan children aged 1 to 12 years, the funding helping the Tongan community ensure their children are taught their native language and are able to learn about traditional music and dancing as part of their culture.

The Arahi Maori Womens Welfare League was granted \$4,000 towards the cost of hosting a Maori Design Show as part of Matariki celebrations, the traditional Maori New Year. It planned to have a wearable art section, Maori artwork exhibition and a photographic display promoting a smoke free message.

The Invercargill City Charitable Trust received \$10,000 towards the cost of the 2012 Southland Buskers Festival. Featuring a line-up of top international acts direct from the World Buskers' Festival in Christchurch, the entertainers performed several times during the three-day event at three venues: Queens Park, Wachner Place and at the Southern Farmers' Market.

Invercargill Repertory Society received a \$10,000 grant towards repairs and an upgrade of its building. The funds will be used to replace the switchboard, relocate the theatre lighting patch panel; upgrade the power supply, entrance and foyer and improve heating and ventilation. The CTOS also provided a \$7,980 Guarantee Against Loss for its production of Four Flat Whites in Italv.

NORTHERN SOUTHLAND

Sport & Recreation

Two community pools benefited from CTOS funding. The **Dipton** Community Baths Trust manages the pool on behalf of the Dipton community. It received \$1,000 towards the repair of fibreglass

lining along the edge of the pool.

The Lumsden Community Pool was closed for 2010-2011 swimming season because it was losing a significant amount of water. An investigation revealed several leaks were present. The CTOS granted \$14,000 towards sealing the pool.

Arts & Culture

The Northern Southland Creative Arts was given \$12,000 towards running the Fusion Gallery and Studio, in Lumsden, and employing an Arts Coordinator to organise and increase the number of exhibitions held there.

SOUTHERN SOUTHLAND

Sport & Recreation

For more than 40 years the Otara Pony Club has been teaching riding skills and hosting gymkhanas and cross-country events for children in the area. Up until now club members have pitched in to

build the cross-country jumps from an array of items, including tyres and logs. But this year it was decided the 18-jump course should be extended. The CTOS grant of \$2,900 has gone towards the professional construction of 11 new jumps made from tanalised timber.

Health

The Southern Southland Community Health Trust oversees health services for 1,500 people from Gorge Road to Mokoreta and the Catlins. The \$2,500 CTOS grant was used for renovations and repairs to the medical centre flat, which is used by relieving and visiting health practitioners. A fireplace was removed, the wall reinstated and radiator heating installed.

Community Support

The Fortrose Hall is used for a variety of sport and social activities. The CTOS grant of \$3,938 went towards the cost of recladding, paint and a replacement window on the south wall.

STEWART ISLAND

Environment

The Stewart Island/Rakiura Community Environment

Trust (SIRCET) has, during the past eight years, successfully implemented a series of projects concentrating on habitat restoration, community involvement and education, and

sustainability. SIRCET's major project - the Halfmoon Bay Restoration Project – oversees the control of possums, rats and feral cats on private and public land around Halfmoon Bay. CTOS covered the Trust's operating costs of \$26,852.

Community Support

With more than a quarter of the population over 60 years of age, **Stewart Island Senior Citizens** provides important

social opportunities for older people living on the Island. With the cost of electricity and heating very high on the Island, the CTOS grant of \$1,053 means other funds can be used on activities such as the mid-winter and Christmas dinners which each attract up to 80 seniors.

the only venue that can cater
for the arts and cultural sector
of the Wakatipu area. It is also
the main community hall used

for social and recreational activities. Its current state means the hall can no longer meet the demands and expectations of current and potential users.

Some of the major structural changes proposed are removal of the mezzanine floor, extending and modernising the foyer/lobby area, seismic strengthening, raising the stage roof, improving the backstage area and installing a retractable wall.

The Wakatipu Youth Trust, which employs four youth workers in the Wakatipu area and operates a youth centre X-it in Queenstown, received \$12,000 towards operating costs. As well as working alongside schools and the wider community, their youth workers provide services and support to youth in the Wakatipu area, including one on one advocacy and support, school holiday and after school programmes, camps and expos, life skills programmes, music and jam events, health and fitness programmes and casual drop-in evenings.

The disAbilities Resource Centre in Queenstown provides support to people in the area with disabilities, including information on equipment and aids, services, finance, disorders, building design and access, legislation, literature, employment, education, rehabilitation and recreation. It received \$30,000 towards operational costs.

Education

The Remarkables Parents Association was granted \$15,692 towards the cost of laying a Play Matta safety surface in the Year 7 & 8 playground at Remarkables Primary School.

Eight schools in the Wakatipu area received the annual CTOS Principals Discretionary Fund payment totalling \$8,602.

Heritage

The Arrowtown and Lakes
District 150th Celebration
Society received funding of
\$20,000 towards hosting its
150th anniversary celebrations
at Labour Weekend 2012.

The organising committee plans to produce the same 1862 gold rush re-enactment that featured during both the 100^{th} and 125^{th}

anniversary celebrations and uses the Arrow River as a stage. Events and attractions will also include: a museum exhibition of 'gold' memorabilia; market day; Chinese/European performance; Chinese Village Theatre; Masonic Lodge open day and an anniversary ball on the Saturday evening. There will be historical walks, gold panning, tours, activities on the Green, a mock trial, golf tournament and wine tours.

The Glenorchy Heritage Museum Group received \$15,000 towards creating a DVD on the making of the Glenorchy Road, restoring a library and events to commemorate the 150th anniversary.

The Queenstown Arts Society, which promotes and encourages the arts in the Wakatipu, received operational funding of \$8,494.

The Autumn Festival (\$11,506), Queenstown Winter Festival (\$10,000) and Queenstown JazzFest (\$10,000) were also supported to encourage community involvement in art and culture activities.


Both Blue Mountain College (\$1,070) and Tapanui Primary School (\$430) received the annual CTOS payment of the Principals Discretionary Fund.

Art Scholarships

With a budget of \$50,000 the arts scholarship helps talented and skilled artists to continue to grow and develop their abilities. Available to both individuals and groups, the funding has also been used to bring elite arts people to Southland for workshops, lectures, master classes or similar. The Community Trust expects applicants will have reached an advanced level and can demonstrate further specialist training and development is required. Among the 19 successful applicants during 2011-12 were:

Mayhla Howell who was awarded an art scholarship to undertake a Diploma of Maori Visual Arts at Te Wananga o Aotearoa, majoring in raranga (Maori weaving). She has a strong desire to support the development of traditional raranga skills in the Southland area by sharing her knowledge with both children and adults. Mayhla's children and grandchildren are Maori

and Pasifika and she wants to guarantee that these skills are maintained with future generations.

Part-way through her study year Mayhla was able to use the traditional raranga technique of whatu – used to make korowai (feathered cloaks) – to create three outfits she entered in the Kaikoura Trash Fashion Show. In all, there was more than 800 hours of weaving and Mayhla took out second place in the 1920s section of the biannual Lions' fundraiser.

She has learnt how to harvest and process a variety of weaving resources such as kiekie and pingao and plans to enter two projects in other shows and events.

Jarn Bulling used his art scholarship to undertake a study

exchange, for a semester, in Product Design at the Institute of European Design, in Milan. Studying for a Bachelor in Design (Product), Jarn has been inspired by the work of his father, Invercargill furniture maker Ivan Bulling and plans, at the end of his study, to carve out a similar career.

Sport Scholarships

Queenstown-based skier. He put his sport scholarship towards a race training camp in Loveland, Colorado, which was with the US Development Team.

Describing the camp as "very intensive" Adam was training with a very high standard of athletes and coached by top level coaches. He received valuable technical advice on improving his racing skills, competition preparation and race simulation. In a June 2012

interview with NZSkier.com, Adam reportedly picked up 14 International Ski Federation medals including seven gold, four silver and three bronze, during a six-month stint in the Northern Hemisphere.

Northern Southland College student Moana-Lyn TeWhata found a 21-day Mind, Body & Soul Outward Bound Course to be life changing. She learned how to be positive even in the most miserable conditions, how to be a stronger leader and the importance of group organisation. "The lessons and inspiration for life I've received here are priceless".

Annichje Riemersma is a support worker for the Community Care Trust. CTOS supported Annichje to undertake an eight-day Compass Outward Bound course. She found the course has given her increased confidence to take up new challenges at work and in her personal life, to step outside her comfort zone and to follow her dreams. In addition, the leadership skills she learned on the course have proved valuable in her work.

General Purpose

Registered electrical inspector **Charles Turner** was one of two applicants to receive a General Purpose Scholarship. CTOS supported Charles to attend the WorldSkills International Competition in London as the NZ National Expert for the

Industrial Control competition category – representing NZ & Southland. His role involved assisting, coaching, mentoring and supporting the NZ representative in this trade category. The competition, featured almost 1,000 competitors from 51 countries.

Tertiary Scholarships

CTOS will introduce a new way of offering some scholarships in the 2012-13 year - particularly those scholarships aimed at secondary school students. This year it awarded 57 Tertiary Education Scholarships, valued at a total of \$348,500. These scholarships are awarded to support individuals embarking on tertiary study for the first time.

Since the Trust first began offering them in 1991, over 800 Tertiary Education Scholarships have been awarded to students across the region, with a combined value of approximately \$4.15 million.


